Understanding The World – The Natural World

How do plants grow?

How do you plant a seed? Put it in soil, water it and put it in the sun. What are the parts of a plant?

The seed grows roots which grow under the soil. A shoot grows out of the soil. The stem grows up and grows leaves and a flower.

VOCABULARY

Soil – The earth that plants grow in.

Roots – The roots grow in the soil. They take the food and water to the rest of the plant.

Stem – The main body of the plant that carries the food up to the leaves. **Leaves** – The flat part attached to the stem. It soaks up the sunlight.
